

BENEFITS OF TREE TRIMMING AND VEGETATION MANAGEMENT TO OUR COOPERATIVE

Clearing trees and overgrown vegetation is essential to providing safe and reliable power to our cooperative members. We

clear certain areas of our distribution system known as "rights of way" in order to:

- Keep vegetation from encroaching on energized power lines.
- Allow for restoration of power outages in a timely manner.
- Protect the safety of our cooperative crews, members and the public.
- Reduce the frequency of outages caused by tree related interruptions.

NOEC utilizes a variety of resources and techniques to maintain vegetation throughout our entire system, depending on the density and terrain. With over 5,200 miles of distribution line to maintain, the conditions and terrain vary greatly within our service area. The far eastern areas of our system, adjacent to the foothills of the Ozarks, are rich with heavy and dense vegetation that present certain limitations in regards to accessibility and limitations due to rough terrain.

NOEC utilizes specialized heavy equipment such as mechanical tree trimmers and mowers to maintain these types of areas. For this terrain, a mechanical approach is the most efficient and cost-effective manner to ensure system reliability and public safety.

With variations in terrain, vegetation density, and membership population, there is no one-size-fits-all solution for right of way maintenance. In more populated areas of our system, distribution lines still traverse through challenging terrain and brush density. Areas like this are still most efficiently maintained using mechanical means but still have challenges of access for right of way crews. In these instances, crews are using smaller, more compact mechanical equipment to perform trimming and mowing maintenance. This equipment involves a basket truck along with a trac unit equipped with a mower attachment.

REQUIREMENT TO REGISTER

At District Meetings

In accordance with Article I of Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative, Inc.'s, Bylaws, only eligible members may register and cast a vote at any member meeting. In order to register and vote you MUST be one of the following:

- Primary on an individual account
- Primary or secondary on a joint account
- Named representative of a business or organization (present a letter from the governing body of the entity stating you are the representative for that entity)

If you are not listed on the account, regardless of marital status, you will not be able to register to vote. We strongly encourage you to check your account. It is simple to add a person to make a joint account. Call member services at 800.256.6405.

The Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative Board of Trustees is extending invitations to Cooperative members in Districts 1, 3, and 5 to attend their respective District Meetings this summer. As always, the invitation includes freebies like soda and giveaways, along with the chance to win a \$250 credit.

Trustee Terms for Charles A. Wyrick, Brian Kelly, and Dandy A. Risman are expiring and Trustee elections are taking place in 2020 for three-year terms on the Cooperative Board of Trustees. The Board is also seeking a little help from members in Districts 1, 3, and 5 to conduct the yearly business of the Cooperative.

Section 4.06 of the Cooperative Bylaws requires any member to file with the Cooperative their Notice of Candidacy for Trustee during the filing period of July 6-10, 2020. The Notice of Candidacy for Trustee must be filed at the Headquarters Office of the Cooperative: 27039 S 4440 Rd, Vinita, OK 74301.

Only pre-qualified candidates can be nominated at District Meetings.

Members may register for District Meetings from 6-7 p.m. Those in line at this time will be given a card ensuring their opportunity to register.

The meeting will start as soon as is practical thereafter or when all members with cards have registered.

NOTE: Currently, the Cooperative is planning to conduct the 2020 District Meetings in the same manner it has conducted District Meetings in the past. However, due to the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic in the United States, there may be government-imposed restrictions or guidelines in place, limiting the size of gatherings such as the Cooperative's District Meetings, or it may otherwise be unsafe to gather for the District Meetings. If such restrictions or guidelines are in place at the time set for the District Meetings, or if it is otherwise unsafe to gather for the District Meetings due to COVID-19, then the Cooperative may take certain actions necessary to maintain the safety of the members, Cooperative employees, and the public, and/or to comply with any government imposed restrictions/guidelines regarding gatherings. These actions may include, but are not limited to: (1) postponing the District Meetings to a later date that is not less than thirty (30) nor more than ninety (90) days prior to the date of the Annual Meeting, in accordance with Section 4.06 of the Cooperative's Bylaws; (2) utilizing drive-thru registration and voting; (3) conducting the District Meetings utilizing live video technology (e.g., Facebook Live); or (4) if necessary, cancelling the District Meetings. The Cooperative will take all reasonable efforts to conduct the District Meetings, nominate Trustee candidates, and elect Trustees in accordance with the Cooperative's Bylaws, while maintaining the safety of the members, Cooperative employees, and the public, and complying with any government-imposed restrictions/guidelines regarding gatherings.

INTERESTED MEMBERS MAY BECOME CANDIDATES

Have you ever considered becoming a member of the Cooperative's Board of Trustees? Members residing in Districts 1, 3, and 5 may run for election if they meet the Trustee qualifications below.

The Board meets regularly to review the performance of the Cooperative, establish goals and operating policies, and ensure the financial health of the Cooperative. For more information on Board participation, please call 800.256.6405, extension 9417.

TRUSTEE QUALIFICATIONS

SECTION 4.02. Qualifications (in part)

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a Trustee of the Cooperative who:

- (a) while serving on the Board or during the five (5) years preceding nomination thereto shall have been finally adjudged to be guilty of a felony; or
- (b) is, becomes, or within the last five (5) years has been employed by the Cooperative, a subsidiary of the Cooperative or a labor union which represents, or has represented, or has endeavored to represent any employees of the Cooperative; or
- (c) is, and if elected and seated as a Trustee will continue to be, a close relative of an incumbent trustee or an employee of the Cooperative; or

The Notice of Candidacy for Trustee MUST be filed at the Headquarters Office of the Cooperative: 27039 S 4440 Rd, Vinita, OK 74301

- (d) has not continuously been, for at least one (1) year prior to nomination, or who ceases after election to be, a member in good standing of the Cooperative, receiving service therefrom at a permanent and year-round residence which is the member's primary residential abode in the Trustee District from which the member is elected; or
- (e) is not at least eighteen (18) years old; or
- (f) is in any way employed by or financially interested in a substantially competing enterprise or a business selling energy, services, or supplies to the Cooperative or its subsidiary businesses; or
- (g) is any way employed by or financially interested in a business selling electrical or plumbing equipment, appliances, fixtures, supplies or wiring to the members.

Notwithstanding the restrictive provisions of this Section that are based upon close relative relationships, no incumbent trustee shall lose eligibility to remain a trustee or to be re-elected a Trustee if, during incumbency, the Trustee becomes a close relative of another incumbent Trustee or of a Cooperative employee because of a marriage or an adoption to which the trustee was not a party.

Upon establishment of the fact that a nominee for Trustee lacks eligibility under this Section or as may be provided elsewhere in these Bylaws, it shall be the duty of the Board to disqualify the nominee. Upon the establishment of the fact that any person being considered for, or already holding, a trusteeship or other position of trust in the Cooperative lacks eligibility under this Section, it shall be the duty of the Board to withhold such position from such person or to cause such person to be removed therefrom, as the case may be.

SECTION 4.06. Nominations (in part)

Any member desiring to be nominated as a candidate for Trustee from the district of his/her residence, shall file, with the Cooperative, written notice on a form provided by the Cooperative, of his/her candidacy and intention to seek nomination for the office of Trustee from his/her district at such time as may be designated as the official filing period by the Board of Trustees. Only persons filing such written notice of candidacy and intention to seek nomination shall be eligible for nomination at said meeting.

SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

TO FOUR OUTSTANDING STUDENTS

Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative is helping ensure a brighter tomorrow for four area high school seniors by supporting their dreams of a life-enriching higher education. Recipients of the 2020 NOEC College Scholarship include: Adair High School's Hannah Guthrie, Afton High School's Kathryn Miller, Jay High School's Sydney Matheson, and Vinita High School's Brannan Vail.



Hannah Guthrie represented the Mayes County area in accepting the 2020 NOEC College Scholarship. Hannah is the daughter of Kenny and Courtney Guthrie.

Hannah graduated from Adair High School in May and will be attending Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College in Miami this fall. She plans on pursuing a career as a physical therapy assistant.

Academic recognition for Hannah included Honor Society, National Society of High School Scholars, and Principal's Honor Roll. At the time of her graduation, she had completed 12 hours of concurrent college credit.

Hannah's extracurricular participation was robust. As a three-sport athlete, she was a key contributor to the school's decorated basketball, track and cross country programs. She helped her team earn state championships in both basketball and track. Hannah was also a member of the school's FCA and FCCLA programs.

"Hannah exemplifies leadership and dedication to her work inside and outside of the classroom while remaining extremely active in our athletic program. Yet, what truly sets Hannah apart from her peers is the well-rounded balance she achieves," commended Michelle Taylor, Adair High School Counselor. Representing the Ottawa County area in accepting the 2020 NOEC College Scholarship is Kathryn Miller. Kathryn is the daughter of Justin and Carrie Miller.

Kathryn graduated from Afton High School in May and plans to pursue a degree in Chemical Engineering at Oklahoma State University this fall. She is a 4.0 student, a member of Northeast Tech Center's STEM Academy, and has completed AP Calculus, AP Physics C, and AP Physics 1 studies.

A member and officer for both the AHS Student Council and National Honor Society, Kathryn served as STUCO reporter and president, NHS reporter and class president (four years). She is a member of Welch Baptist Church, where she was an active member of the youth group and was always more than willing to volunteer time during mission trips.

"Katie has gone on mission trips during the last two spring breaks," explained Kellie Wallace, Worship Leader and Sunday school teacher at Welch Baptist Church. In 2018, she went to Texas where she helped work on a family home that had flooded during the Houston flood. She hung sheetrock in the house and helped clean the yard. Said Wallace: "I have known Katie for several years. She attends church faithfully. She grew up in our church, from the nursery to the children's department and now the youth group. She is very active in our church and is dedicated to helping others. Katie has been our church audio technician over the last two years. She manages the audio and visual equipment necessary for our weekly worship services. She runs the sound system for the church service and special music, and projector during worship time. She also works during revivals and Vacation Bible School. She helps by substituting as a Sunday School teacher in the children's department, works in the nursery and children's church and for several years now has helped with Vacation Bible School by preparing rooms with the VBS director. 

PEANUT BUTTER & CHOCOLATE

BUCKEYE BALLS

- 1 1/2 Cups Creamy Peanut Butter
- 1/2 Cup Butter, Softened
- 1 tsp Vanilla Extract
- 4 Cups Sifted Confectioners' (Powdered) Sugar
- 6 oz Semi-Sweet Chocolate Chips
- 2 TB Shortening

Line a baking sheet with waxed paper; set aside. In a medium bowl, mix peanut butter, butter, vanilla, and confectioners' sugar with hands to form a smooth stiff dough. Shape into balls using 2 teaspoons of dough for each ball. Place on prepared pan, and refrigerate. Melt shortening and chocolate together in a metal bowl over a pan of lightly simmering water. Stir occasionally until smooth and remove from heat. Remove balls from refrigerator. Insert a wooden toothpick into a ball, and dip into melted chocolate. Return to wax paper, chocolate side down, and remove toothpick. Repeat with remaining balls. Refrigerate for 30 minutes to set.



CARAMEL

CHEWY CARAMELS

- 2 Cups White Sugar
- 1 1/2 Cups Corn Syrup
- 2 Cups Heavy Cream
- 1 Cup Butter
- 1 tsp Vanilla Extract

Butter a 9x13 inch dish. In a heavy saucepan, combine sugar, corn syrup, 1 cup cream and butter. Bring to a boil, stirring often, then stir in remaining 1 cup cream. Heat, without stirring, to 242 degrees F (116 degrees C), or until a small amount of syrup dropped into cold water forms a firm but pliable ball. Remove from heat, stir in vanilla, and pour into prepared dish. Refrigerate. When cool, return candies to room temperature then cut into 1 inch squares and wrap in waxed paper.

SUGAR

HOMEMADE MARSHMALLOWS

- 1 Cup Confectioners' (Powdered) Sugar for Dusting
- 2 Cups White Sugar
- 1 TB Light Corn Syrup
- 1 1/4 Cups Water Divided
- 4 TB Unflavored Gelatin
- 2 Egg Whites
- 1 tsp Vanilla Extract

Dust a 9x9 inch square dish generously with confectioners' sugar. In a small saucepan over medium-high heat, stir together white sugar, corn syrup and 3/4 cup water. Heat to 250 to 265 degrees F (121 to 129 degrees C), or until a small amount of syrup dropped into cold water forms a rigid ball. While syrup is heating, place remaining water in a metal bowl and sprinkle gelatin over the surface. Place bowl over simmering water until gelatin has dissolved completely. Keep in a warm place until syrup has come to temperature. Remove syrup from heat and whisk gelatin mixture into hot syrup. Set aside. In a separate bowl, whip egg whites to soft peaks. Continue to beat, pouring syrup mixture into egg whites in a thin stream, until the egg whites are very stiff. Stir in vanilla. Spread evenly in prepared pan and let rest 8 hours or overnight before cutting.



For colorful marshmallows add a few drops of food coloring to the mixture.

FLAVORED

HARD ROCK CANDY

- 1 Cup Confectioners' (Powdered) Sugar
- 3 3/4 Cups White Sugar
- 1 1/2 Cups Light Corn Syrup
- 1 Cup Water
- 2 tsp Cinnamon or Other Flavored Oil
- 1 tsp Food Coloring, Color of Your Choice

Roll the edges of two 16 inch square pieces of heavy duty aluminum foil. Sprinkle the foil very generously with confectioners' sugar. In a large heavy saucepan, combine the white sugar, corn syrup, and water. Heat over medium-high heat, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Stop stirring, and boil until a candy thermometer reads 300 to 310 degrees F (149 to 154 degrees C). Remove from heat. Stir in the cinnamon oil and food coloring. Pour onto the prepared foil, and allow to cool and harden. Crack into pieces, and store in an airtight container. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar if desired.



YOUTH TOUR, ENERGY CAMP CANCELLED FOR 2020

Youth Tour Winners Awarded Scholarship Instead

Amid concerns surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, it was no surprise to learn that the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) made the difficult decision in April to cancel all in-person events through June. This cancellation includes the 2020 Youth Tour, which was scheduled to take place June 19-25.

Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative (NOEC) had already selected and submitted the names of its four winners, each of whom was excited for the opportunity to visit our nation's capital. This year's field of winners included: Bluejacket High School's Shelbie Baker, Pryor High School's Seamus Meehan, Oaks-Mission High School's Tamara Gilmore, and Vinita High School's Emma Speer.

In lieu of the trip, a decision was made to award each of these students a \$1,000 scholarship toward the college, university, or trade school of their choice. The decision was approved by the NOEC board of trustees at its April monthly meeting.

NRECA CEO Jim Matheson explained that the safety of event participants is the number one priority.

"As we continue to monitor the evolving coronavirus situation, I want to assure you that we are taking measures to protect the health and safety of our members, staff and event participants," said Matheson. "Based on the health risks and local, state and national orders, as well as recommendations from the Center for Disease Control, we are canceling in-person NRECA programs through June 24."

Stacy Howeth, Director of Member Services and Youth Tour Coordinator for the Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives (OAEC), expressed her disappointment for the students.

"I'm absolutely heartbroken that this is happening," Howeth told Youth Tour participants. "Youth Tour has been taking place for more than 50 years and has never been cancelled. We are truly in unprecedented times. But I'm sure I don't have to remind you of that. Many of you are experiencing disruptions in all areas of your life. I'm sure there is shared disappointment about cancelled proms, spring sports and school activities, and much more."

Added Howeth: "Even in all this uncertainty, one thing I know for sure is that cooperatives are unwavering in their support for the communities they serve. In fact, one of the operating principles of cooperatives is "Commitment to Community"-but you might already know that from your research when applying for Youth Tour. Everyone involved in Youth Tour, including your sponsoring co-op, your statewide organization (OAEC) and your national organization (NRECA) will do our very best to recognize and honor that fact that YOU were selected to represent your co-op for 2020 Youth Tour. It's just going to look different than ever before, and since we've never been in this position, we're still figuring out the details. Please bear with us as we all take a little bit of time to process the options and determine the best way to move forward at the various levels of involvement."

Energy Camp, scheduled May 26-29, was also cancelled. Not all entries had been received since the deadline for submission had not passed at the time of cancellation, thus no winners were selected for 2020.

Many miles of NOEC distribution line serve very populated areas not suited for the earlier aforementioned mechanical clearing methods. These areas require more labor intensive clearing methods that are more costly and not as efficient as other means Densely populated areas and subdivisions are typically maintained using individual bucket trucks to clear and remove encroaching trees. Tree limbs and debris are then chipped and removed by ground crews

All these types of clearing methods are used to provide a clear and attractive right of way. Our goal is to maintain the rights of way to reduce tree related outages and keep the lights on in a safe, efficient, and effective manner.
